

Now's THE TIME!

It's cold and wet outside, and a great time to be home in a warm shop, or cuddled up next to a warm fireplace with a warm beverage. Sadly, it's also a great time to be out in the cold harvesting wood for woodturning.



When we are out in cold weather without adequate clothing our hands and feet get cold. That happens because our bodies move the warm blood out of our extremities, sending its warmth to our essential innards. I thought trees work roughly the same way. I thought the sap falls down to the roots in the winter and rises up the trunk and branches to the leaves in the Spring, so the best turning wood comes from the relatively dry wood in the trunks and branches of trees that are cut in the Winter before the sap rises in the Spring.

Unfortunately, I tried to verify that by searching on line. I first checked the AAW archives and found amazingly little about the best season to harvest wood for turning. So I did general

Google searches. I found respectable people who apparently know lots about trees pretty much poo-pooing the idea of sap falling and rising. But they appear to agree that something that matters for woodturners does happen for some trees,

at least in some parts of the country.

The consensus seems to be that trunks and branches usually have the same amount of sap (which is mostly water) in them regardless of the season. But one major kind of tree, the deciduous tree, loses its leaves and goes dormant in the Winter, at least in places that have Winter. When a deciduous tree is dormant less water is moving from its roots to its leaves and evaporating into the air. Though the trunk and branches have about the same amount of moisture in them all seasons of the year, somehow the wood harvested in Winter is less likely to split, less likely to lose its bark as it dries, and so is better to turn.



It was sufficiently confusing that I called up my favorite local expert: Dale Larson. Dale, who harvests lots of trees in our neck of the woods, confirmed that we are likely to get better turning wood if the wood comes from deciduous trees that are harvested starting about now and ending in March or April. That's plenty good enough for me!



So now is a good time to be on the alert for trees that have fallen, or are being taken down. If you go after some of that wood, make sure you are prepared. You likely will need gloves, warm clothes, a chainsaw, face and eye protection, and, if your chainsaw is gas powered, ear protection.

I went on a wood harvesting adventure the other day when Kevin Jesequel let me know that a huge chestnut tree had come down in Southeast Portland. The trunk had a diameter of 4 to 5 feet. In retrospect I realize I had no practical idea what that meant. I just thought it meant lots of wood. When we got there I realized that a

diameter of 4 to 5 feet meant the trunk was a bit bigger around than my car. My chainsaw has an 18" bar, and me trying to cut anything off the trunk of that tree was a bit like a chihuahua trying to chew a piece off a rhino. I came home with one piece of branch that was maybe 14" in diameter. You can see more about that chestnut here.

There are only a few out, but the more i get taken care of this way means fewer games of phone tag.



Glenn Ernest Burki

Jun. 1, 1938 - Oct. 12, 2022



Glenn (84) passed away peacefully surrounded family after a valiant battle with cancer. Born to Stella and Ernest Burki in June, 1938 in Portland, Ore., he was the oldest of three children and was preceded in death by his brother James. Following his years at Beaverton High School, Glenn joined the Army and served for three years, including a tour in Germany. When he returned to Portland, he secured a position with a local cabinet shop as an apprentice cabinetmaker, later achieving journeyman status. However, it was his next

employment that would come to define most of the rest of his life. Glenn joined the City of Milwaukie police department in 1962, serving initially as a patrolman, advancing to the position of detective, and ultimately being promoted to sergeant. It was as a police officer that Glenn forged a reputation for honesty and integrity, embodying all the honorable characteristics of a police officer. Upon retirement in 1992 at age 55 he began in earnest to pursue his love of woodworking. Glenn plunged into the world of woodturning – building himself a shop, joining a woodturners group and traveling to numerous shows. Periodically he interrupted his wood turning to build a finely crafted piece of furniture. Family, friends and customers were recipients of his highly prized pieces. Glenn loved a project and was willing to give a hand when and where needed. In addition to his woodworking, Glenn was a member of Al-Anon and a sponsor with Alateen. He also made a trip to Mexico with Medical Teams International for house building.

Glenn is survived by his wife, K'Jilene; sons, Troy (Wanda) and Brian (Jeanne); grand and great-grandchildren, his sister Mary (Mike), and a number of cousins.

A memorial service/celebration of life will be held at 1:30 p.m., Nov. 12, 2022, at Crossroads Church in Portland.

Where – Linn County Expo Center in Albany, Oregon (about 90 minutes south of Portland).

Cost - \$325

The planning for the 2023 Symposium is well underway. This biennial show was canceled in 2021 due to Covid, but it's back again with a fantastic list of demonstrators and vendors.

What it is:

The symposium includes five demonstration rooms, a large vendor area, an Instant Gallery, an auction, and a raffle. Each demo room has four demos on Friday and Saturday, and two on Sunday, so you will be able to see all the demonstrators. A dinner Saturday night is catered and will feature a raffle for a lot of great prizes donated by our vendors.

Albany is an easy drive from Portland, and the facility is well-suited for our event. Two hotels are on-site with reasonable rates.

Cascade will sponsor one of the demo rooms which means we are responsible for outfitting the room with a lathe, grinder, audio/video support, and other items needed by the demonstrator. As a result, Cascade will receive a stipend for that support. Each room has ten demo sessions over the 2 ½ days, and for each demonstration, we will need the support of an A/V operator and an assistant.

Why Attend:

This is a great opportunity to learn from the best. There is something for all, from beginners to advanced turners. Beginners will learn how to make the best cuts and advanced turners will see different ways to enhance your work to make it stand out.

You will also see the latest in woodturning equipment, tools, and jigs. Attending the symposium is your chance to be up close and personal with the demonstrators who are very open and easy to talk with. Plus, you will get to see old friends and

meet many of the best turners in the area.

What Is Needed:

Like our club, the symposium is put on by volunteers, and the symposium is a huge event. Volunteers will receive a symposium t-shirt, and the club will get a stipend depending on how the symposium finances work out.




For Cascade we need:

Now In Stock – The Store now carries 2" Scalloped Sanding Discs, hook & loop backed, for power sanding. Grits available are from 100 through 400. Packages of 10 or 50 available.

Made from the same PS33 aluminum oxide paper as in the sanding sheets. The scalloped edge discs wrap around the edge of the sanding pad so there is no sharp edge to scratch your work.



We continue to carry Klingspor 9x11" sheet sanding paper, Walnut Oil, EndSeal, as well as StarBond CA glues and

accelerator.

VENDOR TIP

The folks from Starbond Superglues sent us this:



With freezing points below -22°F, our CA glue may be stored in the freezer without it freezing or the lower temperature affecting its quality and performance.

However, please note that when the glue is taken out of the fridge or freezer for use, it's generally recommended to wait a few minutes (to allow the glue to warm up to room temperature) before using. When the glue is used at colder temperatures, it will simply have a slower drying time. For best results, it is recommended that the ambient temperature of your work room be above 72°F.

Remember, when our CA glues are stored in a refrigerator or freezer (before and after use), we guarantee a shelf life of 30 months for clear CAs and 20 months for colored CAs. If it doesn't last to the last drop, we'll replace it!


