SAFETY FIRST

Did you ever see a picture of Santa driving his sleigh, holding the reins and encouraging his eight reindeer (nine, if Rudolph is along) to pull fat old Santa, his huge sleigh, and his humongous bag of presents through the air?

Being a woodturner, you probably think about how things work, so you probably understand what would happen if Santa didn't lash the reindeer to his sleigh, and just held on to the reins. The eight or nine reindeer would jerk Santa right out of his sleigh and drag him all the way to Deadhorse, Alaska.

Santa (if he isn't a woodturner and doesn't think things through very well) might try to address this problem by hooking up just one reindeer. Imagine Santa perched on his sleigh, big bag behind, with only Blitzen up front, and nothing connecting Santa, sleigh and contents to Blitzen except a pair of reins. DEMONSTRATORS FACE SHIELDS

"There has finally been a been a push, and a well needed push in my opinion, by all responsible groups and agencies within the woodturning fraternity saying that wearing a full face shield is absolutely mandatory to maintain the safety of your face, head, and eyes while turning wood. Therefore I think it is foolish on Cascade's part to not require all demonstrators to wear a full face shield - no exceptions for anyone at any time. The two reasons at the last meeting for not having the face shield were first, the club does not have a full face shield (a face shield in the school's turning room that was found and used; and secondly, the microphone would not work if used under a face shield. Well the answer to these two issues is very simple. First go buy a good full face shield and keep it with the lathe and secondly buy a microphone that will work under the shield. There are many places in the greater Portland Area that sell face shields and also there are many places that sell lapel microphones that will do the job very nicely. Safety I think in these instances is much more important than what can be heard from the demonstrator. It also sets a bad example for the demonstrator and the club to not follow proper safety practices, and not wearing a full face shield is not following good safety practices. It is to be stressed, that I am talking about a full face shield, not just safety glasses. Safety glasses will assist in protecting the eyes, but not any other part of the face of head, nor will they protect the eyes nearly as well as a full face shield. It is not my intention to tell anyone how to do things in their own shop, if you wish to turn without a face shield at home, that is your business, but it is Cascades business, particularly from and insurance and good safety practices standpoint, to do things properly at all club meetings. Not wearing a safety shield is not doing things properly. Also, for those who do not know where they can purchase a good full face safety shield, here is an address: Sanderson - The Safety Equipment Co., which is located at 1101 S.E. 3rd Ave in Portland, OR 97214. Their phone number is [503-238-5700](tel:503-238-5700) and they are open 7:30AM to 5:30PM on week days and 9:00AM to 3:00PM on Saturday. They are closed on Sunday."

NOVEMBER MEETING

Jim Piper won the monthly challenge with a Christmas ornament turned with the slimmest finial I have seen. There were a large number of well crafted ornaments to compete with including Charley Gray's carved boots. This again showed the high level of skill and craftsmanship in this club.

The demonstration produced a well turned bowl as well as clear description of each step in the turning process by Ben Carpenter.

BIRTH OF A CLUB

In March of 2013 Woodturner Rick Rich of Battle Ground had sent an email to the woodturning groups in the Portland area suggesting a Chapter of AAW be formed in the SW Washington area for those local woodturners who lived near Battle Ground, WA.

I contacted Rick and informed him that there was a group of woodturners that meet at the Friends of the Carpenter Center in Vancouver every month and had been meeting there for the previous two years. He was invited to attend a meeting and give a presentation to the group, which he did. As a result, the group voted to join the American Association of woodturners and after electing officers, creating a set of By Laws and submitting the required paperwork to the AAW, became an official chapter in April of 2013 receiving

generous financial and equipment support from the Olympic Woodturners Group, Cascade Woodturners and Northwest Woodturners as well as the American Association of Woodturners themselves, for which we are truly grateful.

The Southwest Washington Woodturners now meet the 4th Wed. of each month with the exception of November and December. Those meetings are scheduled around Holidays. The meetings are held at the Friends of the Carpenter Friendship Center at 1600 West 20th St. in Vancouver, WA from 7 PM to 9 PM. Monthly demonstrators have included several members of Cascade Woodturners, Northwest Woodturners and Turners from the local community as well.

The mission of the Southwest Washington Woodturners is to provide a place for members to meet, share ideas and techniques, trade woods and ideas. We sponsor workshops and demonstrations and have constructive critiques of member's turnings if they wish. Also, we provide turnings from time to time to the Friends of the Carpenter which helps to support their mission to provide daytime activities for the local homeless and less fortunate persons in the area.

In addition, together with the Friends of the Carpenter we provided woodturning demonstrations at the Portland Expo Center this past November at the Woodworking show. We were fortunate enough to be able to provide lathes and help to local school children who were being introduced to woodturning for the first time. At the December workshop, the Group also made Christmas ornaments that were donated to the Friends of the Carpenter.

Making a Multi-Axis Box

This article describes how I make a box with a lid turned on multiple axis.



We start with a nice chunk of walnut, about 2.5" square x 6" long.

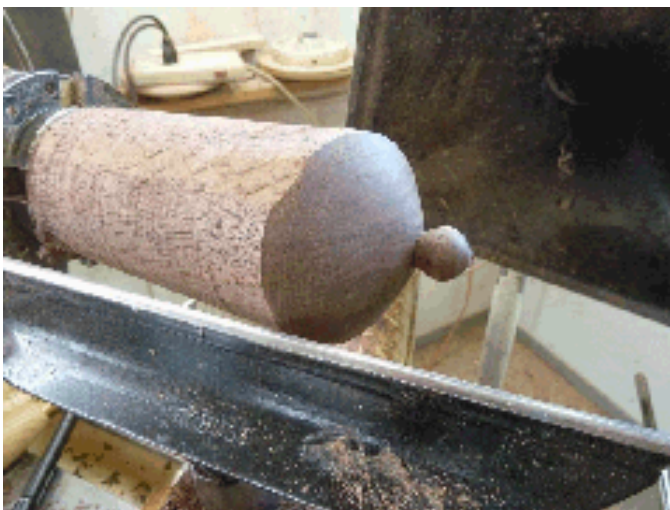
Insert it into a chuck (a Talon in this case), and turn a slightly rounded tenon on the end.





Flip it and put it in the chuck slightly offset. Support it with the tailstock (using a revolving center). The tip of the finial will be where the point of the tailstock is. Don't put it really close to the edge...you'll need some room for the finial.

Start removing wood to shape the finial and top surface.



The finial and top surface is almost done. Note the small divot in the finial. This needs to be turned away. Be sure and allow for that...it will shorten the finial a bit.

Completely sand all surfaces. You won't get another chance...unless you sand by hand.



Now the wood is re-chucked on a different axis...opposite of what it was. When you position your tool rest, give the wood a spin by hand to make sure it the wood doesn't hit it. But get it as close as possible. When the wood is away, there will be quite a gap...but almost no gap when it's close. CHECK FIRST before turning on the lathe or you'll get a nasty surprise.

Start turning away the wood. Use sharp tools, and as high a speed as you're comfortable with. Take nice easy shallow cuts and don't rush it...just a little at a time. Try to make complete cuts from outer diameter to inner diameter. Don't stop and don't make interrupted cuts, particularly on the final cuts.





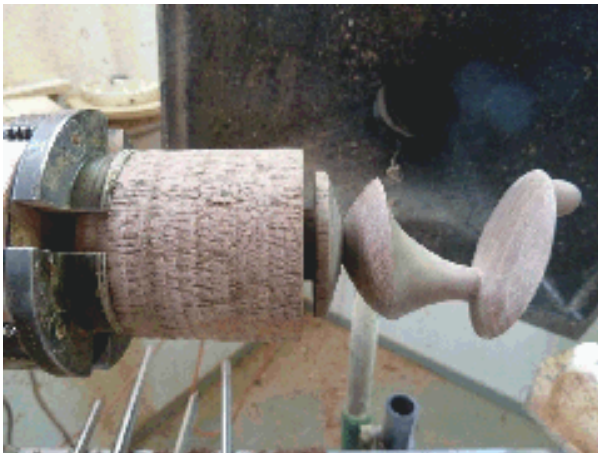
This shows the position of the gouge when cutting the underside of the top surface. Be very careful. If you come in at the wrong angle, you'll chew up the edge and possibly rip off the final. The object is a nice sharp edge. KEEP YOUR FINGERS AWAY FROM the wood...the edges are (or should be) sharp.

This is the finished surface for this axis. It now needs to be completely sanded. Be very careful when sanding under power. Hold the sandpaper lightly. It could be grabbed and pull your fingers towards the sharp edge.



Now the piece had been re-chucked such that's it's in it's normal position.

Part down to where you want the lid to start, and make the shoulder that will sit into the base.



Do the final shaping, sand, and cut off. To part off, I use a parting tool to go down to about 1/4", then stop and use a small saw to cut it off.

Now were starting in on the box. From here on out, it's just a simple box. Sometimes I drill out the center first before hollowing. That way I know when it's deep enough and don't need to stop and measure all the time during the hollowing process.





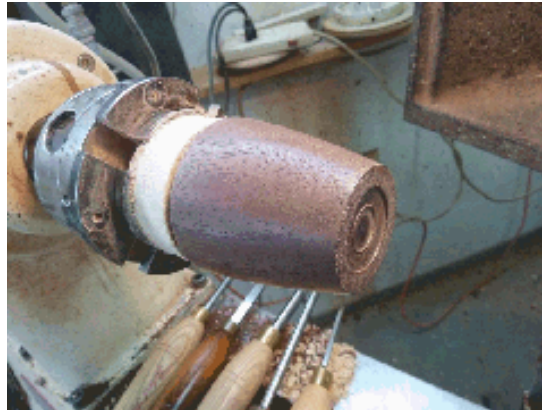
Box has been fully hollowed and the recess for the lid turned.

Some preliminary shaping of the outside has now been done.



The box has been reversed turned onto a jam chuck for the final shaping of the outside.

Box has been fully shaped and sanded.



The lid will have a bit of a nub where it was cut off. I just use a small disk sander to clean that off.



This is the finished box.
